Course Description: This class introduces students to the varieties of religious experience in Los Angeles and its environs. Presentations, required readings, and (where possible) site visits will shape the engagement of course participants with selected faiths and spiritual practices throughout Southern California and provide a deeper understanding of the myriad ways that the sacred is made manifest and encountered in the region. Foundational academic orientations within the study of religion (anthropological, historical, psychological, sociological, etc.) will be introduced as frameworks for examining and interpreting the City of Angels' almost unparalleled religious diversity. Recognizing that spiritual traditions are a crucial reflection of the region's ever changing demographics, emphasis will be placed on the role of ethnicity, gender, nationality, and race in the shaping of the religious landscape.

<u>Texts and Viewings</u>: Required text: Eck, "A New Religious America: How a "Christian Country" Has Become the World's Most Religiously Diverse Nation"; other key readings (academic articles, news reports, and popular accounts) and viewings are posted on the course website. DVD/VHS videos will also be shown in class.

<u>Attendance and Course Participation</u>: Attendance is mandatory. All participants are required to discuss readings, viewings, and writing assignments and should attend class prepared to do so.

Writing Assignments: All participants will complete three (3) short writing assignments (750-1000 words) that are geared toward heightening student awareness of religious diversity in Los Angeles and the development of a deeper understanding of how a multiplicity of faiths are expressed/experienced in the City of Angels and their impact on civic life.
