☐ General Knowledge	At its core, this is social science, evidence-based public policy course. It also uses journalism, filmmaking, music and poetry to probe the ethical and moral aspects of homelessness in society.			
☐ Integrative Learning	The course is grounded in social science research, supplemented by government reports, contemporary journalism, music, film, and guest lecturers involved in policy-making.			
☐ Ethical Implications	The course opens with a discussion of Frost's "Death of the Hired Man," which is a dialogue of responsibility for the weak and vulnerable, the same ethical and moral debate that animates the politics of public policy on homelessness that will be discussed throughout the course.			
☐ Cultural Diversity	Diversity, poverty, and inequality are at the heart of all homelessness policy discussions. African Americans make up 40% of people experiencing homelessness in LA, Latinos are 35%, but comprise the fastest-growing group. Beyond statistics, diversity issues are reflected in the readings, films, site visits, and guest lecturers.			
☐ Critical Thinking	There is no harder issue for critical thinking than homelessness. There is no magic bullet solution, philosophy, theory of approach, much of policy making around homelessness involves making decisions about what's the least inadequate alternative, hence teaching it through the lends of policy and policy making over the last 30 years.			
☐ Rhetorical Effectiveness	The final assignment is a policy memorandum addressed to a hypothetical potential candidate for office in Los Angeles summarizing the challenges, the current approaches to solving the challenges, and recommendations of how the candidate might distinguish herself on the issue. Students will also present this argument orally.			
☐ Problem-solving	See above.			
☐ Library & Information Literacy	As stated previously, the course uses a wide range of traditional and online sources, students will be expected to draw from and research a similar range of sources in their final policy memorandum.

This class will examine urban homelessness with close comparative attention to the 30-year evolution of policy and practices in Los Angeles, Santa Monica, and New York City. The class will examine data on homelessness and research on causes and solutions, with particular attention to the politics of homelessness, advocacy, and particular policy strategies regarding mental illness, substance abuse, income and employment, crime and law enforcement, and shelter and housing. Course requirements include three reflection papers, (25% of the course grade) an in-class midterm examination (25%), and a final policy memorandum regarding the implementation of Measures H and Measure HHH in Los Angeles County (35%) Students are also required and participate in discussions (15%).

Students will submit three 700-800 word reflection papers, one a documentary film, one on a supplemental book from the syllabus, and one based on a walking tour of Skid Row, volunteering in a homeless shelter or similar close contact with homelessness. Students will also submit a final 1500-word policy memorandum addressed to a hypothetical potential candidate for office in Los Angeles summarizing the challenges, the current approaches to solving the challenges, and recommendations of how the candidate might distinguish herself on the issue. There will also be a mid-term examination what will include multiple choice and short, open-ended questions.

In addition to the readings listed in the syllabus, additional appropriate readings from news reporting on homelessness will be added from the Los Angeles Times, the Los Angeles Daily News, The New York Times, and National Public Radio, and other publications.
